Rabies is dangerous for my family, including my pet.

For the Teacher/Parent:

Rabies is a deadly disease caused by a virus. It is usually transmitted by animals to humans through the bite of dogs and cats infected with rabies. Other routes of transmission are through introduction of rabies-infected saliva into fresh wounds, scratches and body parts with mucous membranes such as the nose, eyes and mouth.

Children are particularly at risk because of their size and activities. Rabies cannot be treated but it is 100% preventable, by vaccinating dogs and cats against rabies at three months of age and every year thereafter.

If bitten by a dog or cat, the following should be done:

- 1. Wash the wound immediately with soap and running water for 15 minutes.
- 2. Apply iodine or an antiseptic if available.
- Go to the nearest doctor or clinic.

2. Take good care of your pets. Give them enough food, exercise, companionship and a safe place to stay. Don't keep them tied up all the time.




3. Do not let your pet dogs and cats roam freely in the streets and other public places.

4. Do not mistreat dogs and cats. Do not kick them, pull their tails or throw stones at them.





5. Stay away from stray dogs and cats. Do not bother your pet dogs and cats when they are sleeping, eating or feeding their young.








7. Immediately tell an adult (parent, teacher, guardian) about the bite and ask them to take you to a clinic or doctor.




Remember that people can get rabies from the saliva (from a bite or scratch) of a rabid dog or cat.


